



Legislative

- On December 4, 2017 PTACHC met with Howard County Legislative Delegation On "BUY-UP" APFO mitigation provision. One year later Opportunity to address is available.
- ► The County Building Excise Fee for new school construction is authorized by the state based on a one-time \$ Per SQFT of new construction basis
- ► The County Transfer Tax is applied to sales of property (old and new), which is dedicated to land acquisition and is shared as a percentage with openspace, agpres, fire
- ► Each of these are notably lower than adjacent districts. *Note there is no verification that adjacent districts fees are adequate.
- The State may reconsider it's "matching formula" of 55% at any time.
- ▶ Debate over "where kids come from" (I.E. the source of enrollment growth) is the basis for calculating the responsibility of the fees.







Simple Math... The RULE OF TWO What would you need in \$ per SqFt fees if Howard County were to double in density overnight?

- One-Time county costs to build 42 Elementary, 20 middle and 12 High schools at market rates. (actually more Not all are at 100% today)
- Student yield per SqFt of new residential construction An odd, but measurable quantity in averages or actual.
- Costs to acquire land for 77 schools at market rate using transfer tax. (measurable through state tax assessments, historical trends)
- ► Transfer tax revenue from sale of 119,555 units to 327,629 residents. (July 2018 data)
- The resultant rate formulas would be applicable for this 100% growth scenario or actual real-life planned growth rates of 2-5% as long as they are regularly recalculated.
- This theoretical rate can change based on state sharing formulas, construction costs and dozens of other factors that require regular review to minimize lost revenue.
- ▶ Lost revenue=compromises such as redistricting, trailers, overcrowding etc.
- ▶ Alternative calculation = Slight changes or offsetting regulations based on political compromise



HIGH SCHOOL OVERCROWDING OPTIONS

- Option 1. JumpStart Trailing Siblings: Based on trends, in SY 2019-20, 13 to 24 percent of students at Centennial, Long Reach and Howard high schools are expected to take advantage of either JumpStart or other existing off-campus programmatic offerings.
- Option 2. Boundary Adjustments: Boundary adjustments are an option for SY 2019-20, based on Policy 6010.
- Option 3. Open Enrollment: Open enrollment would offer family choice for reassignment from Centennial, Howard, Long Reach and Mt. Hebron high schools to attend out-of-district schools that are currently below capacity, such as Glenelg, Marriotts Ridge and Oakland Mills high schools.
- Option 4. Rising 9th Grade Temporary Reassignment: For four years, each class of rising 9th graders geographically assigned to Howard or Centennial high schools would be reassigned to a receiving school for one year before transferring to their geographic home high school.
- Option 5. Rising 9th Grade Permanent Reassignment: A single cohort of rising 9th graders geographically assigned to Howard or Centennial high schools would be assigned to a receiving school for the entirety of their high school experience.
- Option 6. 9th Grade Academy: As a mid- to long-term possibility, HCPSS could establish a 9th grade academy after a renovation of the Faulkner Ridge Center.
- Option 7. Do Nothing: This option keeps the status quo for SY 2019-20.
- Option 8. Other: Other suggestions that are not listed.
