# What is a civic organization and what is civic engagement?

Civic organization means a community-based company, club, committee, association, corporation, or any other organization or group of persons acting in concert which is composed of persons who are members thereof on a voluntary basis and which is primarily established to further educational, charitable, religious, cultural, or local economic development purposes." ## Why is civic engagement important?

- "In the past few years...Americans' participation in civic life—or 'civic engagement'— has declined dramatically. According to Harvard Professor Robert Putnam, over the last 25 years, Americans' participation in public meetings is down by 35 percent and participation in clubs and civic organizations has been cut by more than half.
- ...[This is] bad news for democracy. Alexis de Tocqueville pointed out in his Democracy in America that the key to making American democracy work is our willingness to create and maintain a variety of civic associations.
- Against the backdrop of weakened civic engagement, the issues facing our increasingly globalized world are becoming more complex. And the activities that traditionally boost citizens' understanding of these issues—like newspaper readership—are also in decline."

## Local Policy and Legislative Bodies

- Board of Education oversees educational matters that affect Howard County; eight members, seven elected by the voters (two at-large, five by councilmanic district) to four-year terms, and a student member with limited voting rights, who serves a one-year term and is chosen by County students. (https://www.hcpss.org/board)
- County Council serves as the county's legislative branch, as the Zoning Board, and as the Liquor Board; five members elected from five separate districts who serve four-year terms a three term limit for Council members. The elected members of the Council. They also provide constituent services for residences in their district. (https://cc.howardcountymd.gov)

## **State and Federal Legislative Bodies**

#### Maryland General Assembly

- Maryland's legislative body, directly represents the electorate, with 47 districts represented by 47 Senators and 141 Delegates (<u>http://mgaleg.maryland.gov</u> Members > Find My Representative > Lookup MHHS District 9A/B)
- Enact laws and propose amendments to the Maryland Constitution
- Meet in regular session for 90 calendar days each year beginning the second Wednesday in January, acting on more than 2500 pieces of legislation and the State's annual capital and operating budgets
- United States Congress Bicameral legislature of the federal government of the United States, the House of Representatives and the Senate; 535 voting members: 100 senators and 435 representatives (<u>https://www.house.gov</u> or <u>https://www.senate.gov</u> – Find Your Representative – MHHS District 7)

# 2021 MGA Reopening Guidelines

- See the Senate Reopening Guidelines, House Reopening Guidelines, and House Committee Guidelines, on the MGA website (Home page right side) for details on reopening and operational guidelines. Always verify procedures with MGA staff to get the most current information during session. Procedures may be changed by the Speaker of the House, President of the Senate or Committee Chairs, as needed, at any time.
- State House: State House will likely be closed to the public for the legislative session to prevent large crowds from congregating inside.
- Lawyer's Mall: Construction on Lawyer's Mall will be completed by January, so outdoor rallies will still be permitted, if socially distanced and masked, based on City of Annapolis guidelines.

#### Senate Operations Plan

- Daily Access Only Senators, two approved staffers per office with daily health check, telework, social distancing & face covering requirements, testing required for members and staff, rapid tests available on-demand. Press have daily access to facilities; interns and contractual employees - remote only; guests – only permitted in Stage 3, must be escorted while in building.
- **Committee Room Precautions** Members of the Public virtually testify via Zoom.
- Committee Witnesses Default Senate Bill Hearings: Bill Sponsor, 4 favorable witnesses, 2 favorable with amendment witnesses, and 4 unfavorable witnesses. Chairs may increase the number of witnesses on select bills when a bill is assigned a hearing date -- 8 favorable, 4 favorable with amendments, and 8 unfavorable. With the exception for "lead proponent," who has 5 minutes to testify, all witnesses will be provided with 2.5 minutes to testify.

### Senate Committee Witnesses (Continued)

- Favorable/Sponsor: The last Favorable witness slot shall be opened up to the public, for a randomly-selected witness. If the Sponsor does not notify the committee of witness signup within 48 hours of witness signup opening, the slots will be open to the public in a randomized selection.
- Favorable with Amendments: Favorable with Amendments witnesses will have 2 slots, one selected at random, the other selected at the discretion of the Chair.
- Unfavorable Witnesses: will also be provided 4 witness slots. Up to two of these slots will be "organizational" slots, and the Chairs shall use their discretion to ensure that organizations most accurately reflect groups opposed. The other two opposition slots will be randomly selected by those who sign up.

- Senate Scheduling Considerations: The Senate may not convene daily, especially for the first third of Session. Floor sessions will be scheduled with notice to all Senators. On days without floor session, committees will be urged to start hearings earlier in the day, and a block of time may be reserved so Senators can meet with constituents, virtually or in person.
- House Office Building: House will allow access to the public and other nonlegislative officials by appointment only, to avoid unnecessary crowding in hallways. Any meeting guests will have to be escorted to and from the main entrance to the House Office Building and your office.
- District Nights, Legislative Receptions and Committee Dinners: All such events are cancelled for in-person participation for the 2021 session.

# 2021 Operational Planning Highlights

- House Committees: Operate virtually, bill hearings begin January 14th, Committee Chairs will provide at least 48-hour member and public notice as to which bills will be heard during which time slot on which day via the MGA website.
- Online Testimony Submission, Sign Up and Availability: The public will be able to sign up to testify and upload written testimony through the MGA website. Testimony for each bill will be posted on the MGA website after a bill is voted out of the relevant standing committee.
- Voting and Subcommittee Meetings: All subcommittee meetings and voting sessions will be livestreamed through the MGA website.
