

Howard County Board of Education – School Safety Personnel Ho. Co. 1-22

FOR the purpose of requiring the Howard County Board of Education to develop a plan to implement certain school safety guidelines that replaces school resource officers in public schools in Howard County with adequate law enforcement coverage provided by school coverage officers, effectively addresses the need for certain personnel, and requires school coverage officers and school security employees to complete a certain model training program; defining the term "school coverage officer"; requiring the county board to solicit and incorporate input from stakeholders in the Howard County Public School System and school community; and generally relating to school safety personnel in Howard County.

<u>Howard County – Department of Housing and Community Development – Housing Opportunities Trust Fund,</u> Ho. Co. 5-22 (PASSED BY THE DELEGATION 1/19/22)

FOR the purpose of establishing the Housing Opportunities Trust Fund as a non-reverting special fund to be used to promote equitable access to affordable housing for households of limited income in Howard County; requiring the Department of Housing and Community Development for Howard County to report on the activity of the Fund during the prior fiscal year on or before a certain date each year; and generally relating to funding for affordable housing in Howard County.

Howard County – Commercial Building Excise Tax – Board of Education Deferred Maintenance, Ho. Co. 8-22

FOR the purpose of authorizing the County Council of Howard County to impose an excise tax on commercial building construction; requiring the excise tax revenue to be used only for deferred maintenance needs identified by the Howard County Board of Education; and generally relating to a commercial building excise tax in Howard County and deferred maintenance in the Howard County Public School System.


CB-13 Removing notification signs 15 days after hearing/event. Keep in mind a major change notices have a variety of times that they are required depending on department and can be removed within the timeframe of a single PTA monthly meeting or sooner.

CB-15 changes planning board appointee process to represent each district. To enforce members to take required State training. The planning board generally weighs in on school construction projects, long range plans, budgets and related items like the General plan, Adequate Public Facilities Ordinance (APFO) and large projects.

Of Note for environmentally conscious members – **CB-14** is introduced this month as a new variant of a series of forest conservation plans that have yet to be approved by the council.

BILLS DECIDED ON FEB 7th

CB-6/11 Citizens Election Fund – Affects candidate viability.

CB-7/8 Requiring affordable housing in Turf Valley. Could change student poverty concentration levels. It does *not* change Turf Valley APFO exemptions allowing school overcrowding.

CB-9 APFO School Overcrowding Exemption Process – Notice this will be tabled for a month to draft new amendments.

CB-17 Complete Streets Manual – Rewrite of Road Design Manual with Specific changes to walkability standards affecting students and reducing APFO road test standards to encourage transit use through higher acceptable road congestion levels. https://www.howardcountymd.gov/transportation/complete-streets-implementation-team






Budget

The BOE will adopt their adaptation on Feb. 24th, 2022.



Preliminary Estimates: Blueprint Budgetary Impact, FY23 – FY30





Renaming

A 272-page report from the county Public Spaces Commission was released Jan 14, 2022.

The commission was tasked with researching if names were associated with oppression.

The report lists 13 schools associated with oppression 4 school listed as uncertain association and 46 schools with no association.

The report lists 3 libraries associated with oppression and 4 libraries with no association.

The report lists 8 parks associated with oppression and 9 parks with no association.

The report lists 4 County administrative buildings associated with oppression and 0 with no association.

Of note:

- The Report recommends establishment of future Committees.
- Only two items of public testimony were submitted.
- Selection decision varies from standards for both inclusion and disassociation examples.
- Videos of meetings showed members requesting additional time for research.
- The amount of road names and deadline requirement left review to a future committee.
- Meeting minutes and videos of sessions are not public yet.
- The commission chair and author of the report stepped down the day the report was released.
- PTACHC did not have representation on this committee.
- HCPSS maintains the authority to rename schools.
