CB-26-2022 extends the regulation to allow reservation of Commercial Space In new developments for HCPSS leases at market rate.

This is geared toward serving blueprint Pre-K requirements and discouraging commercial to residential conversions in new mixed-use development.

Bill may be passed/defeated/amended/tabled May 4.
