FORMS OF ADVOCACY

 Direct service organizing would be a PTA unit purchasing new computers for a school that cannot afford them.

 Research and education The purpose is to collect information on a specific topic and educate members and the public on that particular issue; writing issue briefs.

 Speaking out on behalf of other people. Common examples are testifying at a Board of Education, speaking at a budget, participating in outreach sessions

Example: school location, AFPO and surrounding infrastructure need






